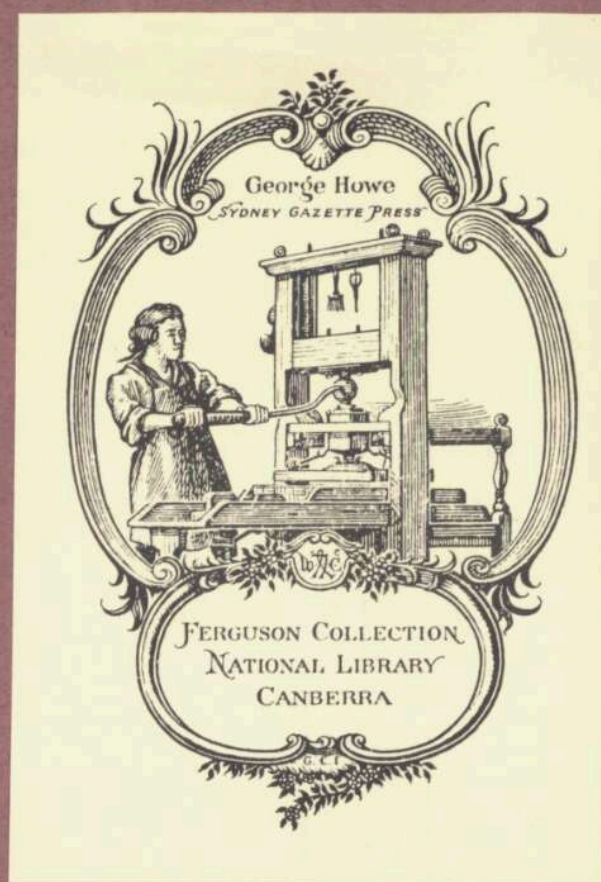

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I.—GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

1. The great expansion of the Citizen Forces of Australia, due to the introduction of Universal Training, and the decision of Parliament that officers as well as other ranks are to be supplied with uniform free, has necessitated the simplification of patterns, and the reduction of articles not needed for training or active service to the minimum. All ranks will realize that the changes made herein are absolutely necessary, not only on account of the great expenditure involved, but also to prevent the work of manufacture, issue, and accounting for uniforms from becoming too complex.

2. These Orders came into force on 1st July, 1912, the commencement of Universal Training in the Militia units.

3. District Commandants and Commanding Officers will be held responsible that no deviations from authorized patterns are permitted.

B.—OFFICERS.

Optional Uniform.

When not on parade with troops the following uniform may be worn:—

Hat (or cap, S.D.) with coloured band according to arm; white linen collar and black tie, with white shirt; trousers*; brown boots. Officers may also wear trousers when at mess in the evening at camps of training.

Swords will be worn in Full Dress, and on other occasions when ordered.

The revolver, case, and pouch, field glasses or telescope, note books, compass, and whistles will be carried in No. 1, Marching Order.

At balls, dinners, or other entertainments, at which uniform is ordered, cap, service dress; jacket; trousers; boots; S.B. belt without sword or frog will be worn.

* Or breeches with leggings or puttees according to whether mounted or dismounted.

On other occasions of an official or public character, or when their Excellencies the Governor-General or the Governor of a State are present, evening dress with miniature orders and decorations will be worn. For wearing of Orders, &c., see Appendix III.

IV.—DESCRIPTION OF ARTICLES OF CLOTHING, ETC., ISSUED FREE TO THE MILITIA FORCES.

4. All articles not herein described in detail will be made in accordance with the Sealed Patterns, which are kept in the Ordnance Store of each Military District.

5. All uniforms will be supplied free to all ranks of the Militia Forces.

6. **Badges of Rank**—The rank of Officers is shown by badges as under :—

Field-Marshal ..	..	Crossed batons on a wreath of laurel, with crown above.
General ..	..	Crossed sword and baton, with crown and star above.
Lieutenant-General ..	..	Crossed sword and baton, with crown above.

Badges of rank, except when otherwise ordered, will be worn on shoulder straps. They will be in gilt or gilding metal. The crowns when laid on shoulder cords or shoulder straps are 1 inch broad and 1 inch in height; the stars are 1 inch between opposite points.

General officers' badges are worn in pairs, point of sword to the front and edge of blade outwards or towards the arm.

The sword is 2 inches long and the baton $\frac{1}{8}$ inch shorter.

Officers having brevet, local, temporary or honorary rank wear the badges of that rank.

7. Badges, Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers and Special.—These are described in Appendix II.

8. Belts, "Sam Browne."—The universal pattern, "Sam Browne," with two braces for dismounted officers and one brace over the right shoulder for mounted officers, without sword frog except when the sword is worn, will be worn by all branches with service dress.

9. Boots.—When on duty with troops, the service pattern will be worn. At other times, ordinary tan leather or black boots, plain or patent leather, may be worn with the trousers.

10. Breeches.—Khaki cord, universal pattern, as sealed. There are two patterns, mounted and dismounted. On transfer from the latter to the former service or duty, new pattern breeches are supplied.

11. Buttons.—Buttons will be of brass of universal pattern. These will be placed as in sealed patterns. The sizes are as follows :—

12. Cap, Field Service.—Universal pattern.

13. Cap, Service Dress.—To be in accordance with the universal sealed pattern, a coloured band, as for hats, to be worn between the welts, and the numeral of the unit in the centre of the front part of the band.

The peak to be plain for all ranks, to drop at an angle of 45 degrees, and to be $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep in the middle. Caps to be worn straight on the head.

14. Collars.—White linen stand-and-fall collar not less than $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches in height, and black tie, with an ordinary white shirt, or khaki collar and tie with khaki shirt, will be worn by officers as directed in Section III. "Orders of Dress."

15. Decorations and Medals.—See Appendix III.

16. Gloves.—Brown leather, but for evening entertainments white gloves may be worn.

17. Great Coat.—Universal pattern as sealed, for all ranks. A waterproof coat of other material may be substituted in special cases, in places within the tropics.

18. Hat.—Khaki felt in accordance with sealed pattern. Looped up on left side with hook and eye. Leather chin strap. Cloth band, 2 inches wide of following colours :—

19. The numeral of the unit will be worn by all ranks on the front of the hat, and in the centre of the band.

20. Jacket, Commonwealth Pattern, Officers (step collar).—Single-breasted, cut as a lounge coat to the waist with back seam, very loose at the chest and shoulders, but fitted at the waist; waist band $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide, military skirt to bottom edge; length of skirt, 13 inches for a man 5 feet 9 inches, varying in proportion to height, step collar, depth of opening about 3 inches, two cross-patch breast pockets above, $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide and $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep from the top of the flap, box plait in centre $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide, three-pointed flap $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide and $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches deep, two expanding pockets below the waist plaits at the sides, $9\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide at the top and $10\frac{1}{2}$ inches at the bottom, 8 inches deep to the top of the pocket and fastened at the top with a line 26 button, flap with button-hole to cover pockets $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep, $10\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide, sewn into the bottom edge of the waistband. The top of the plaits of the pockets should be sewn down at the corners in such a manner that on service the pocket can be expanded at the top also; outside ticket pocket in the top of the waistband on the right side; inside watch pocket with leather tab above for chain or strap. Four line 32 buttons down the front, the bottom one just below the lower edge of the waistband. To be lined or not as required, with lining of similar colour to the jacket. Pointed cuffs. Shoulder straps of same material as the jacket, fastened with line 26 buttons.

21. Jacket, Service Dress.—Universal pattern as sealed, for all ranks except officers.

22. Leggings.—Brown leather to sealed pattern, for all ranks for whom authorized.

23. Mourning Bands.—Officers and Warrant Officers in uniform when in mourning or attending funerals will wear a black band $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide round the left arm, midway between the elbow and the shoulder. This is the only mourning to be worn in uniform unless other orders are specially issued, and will not be worn at levees or drawing-rooms except when the Court is in mourning.

24. Puttees.—Woollen, khaki, of sealed pattern, 3 yards long. They will be rolled forward on the inside of the leg, and backward on the outside commencing at the ankle. The point is to finish on the outside pointing to the rear. All puttees in a unit are to be rolled and tied in the same manner.

25. Saddlery.—Universal pattern as sealed.

26. Spurs, Steel.—Spurs, universal pattern, with brown leather straps and guards. Spurs will not be worn on board ship, or by officers inspecting armaments or magazines.

27. Swords and Scabbards.—Will be of the regulation pattern.

28. Sword Knots.—To be of sealed pattern, brown leather, and worn with all swords. In mounted services to be worn at full length, others rolled round basket of hilt.

29. Trousers, Commonwealth Pattern.—Universal pattern, as sealed.

CHAPLAINS.

30. Service Dress.—To be worn on mobilization for war only:—

Cap, Service Dress.—Universal pattern (see para. 13), with black leather chin strap, and black buttons. Badge, in black metal, a cross patee on a plain metal tablet, surmounted by a crown.

Jacket.—Khaki cloth, Commonwealth pattern (see para. 20), with a step collar, and fastened with four buttons. To be open above the top button, and worn with a white collar and black clerical stock. Shoulder-straps edged with two broad stripes of black

cloth showing half an inch of cloth between. Badges of rank in black metal on the shoulder straps.

Buttons—Black metal.

Collar Badges—As for cap, but smaller.

Trousers or Breeches }
Puttees or Leggings } Commonwealth pattern.

Boots—Brown, ankle.

Great coat—Universal pattern, but with buttons and shoulder straps, as for jacket.

31. Optional Uniform.—To be worn during peace time, with ordinary clerical dress, at the option of the Chaplain.

Forage Cap.—Universal pattern, black cloth, with welts of black cord, and band of plain mohair braid. Peak embroidered with $\frac{1}{4}$ -in. plain black embroidery; black chin strap, and black buttons. Badge, in gilt, a cross patee on a plain metal tablet, surmounted by a crown, but until supplies are received the Commonwealth badge will be worn.

Collar Badge.—As for cap badge, but smaller.

UNATTACHED OFFICERS.

32. Officers on the Unattached List will wear the uniform, &c., of the unit with which they last served on the Active List.

Area officers who did not hold commissions in the Military Forces at the date of temporary appointment as area officers will wear the uniform prescribed for infantry officers, with Commonwealth badges.

33. Officers who did not hold commissions in the A.M.F. at the time of joining the A.I.F. should wear the uniform of the branch of the service to which they belonged in the A.I.F., with Commonwealth badges.

RESERVE OF OFFICERS.

34. Officers of the Reserve of Officers will wear the uniform &c., of the unit with which they last served.

RETIRED OFFICERS.

35. Officers who have been retired, and are permitted to retain their rank, may wear the uniform of the unit with which they last served, with the letter "R" below the badges of rank in similar material to those badges.

Note.—Whenever Officers of the Unattached, Reserve, or Retired Lists require to renew their uniforms, the latest approved patterns will be followed.

AUSTRALIAN ARMY NURSING SERVICE.

36. (a) Outdoor—

Grey Serge Coat, Skirt and Blouse.

Dress : Material, Grey Serge.—Plain walking skirt and shirt blouse, and stand up collar. Blouse to be fastened with 5 Commonwealth buttons (26 lines) in front. Two Commonwealth buttons (18 lines) on sleeve. White collar and plain undercuffs. Collar fastened with Commonwealth brooch, belt of similar material as dress, 2 inches wide, fastened with one large Commonwealth button.

Norfolk Coat.—Tailor made, bands coming over shoulder back and front, stitched belt round waist, chocolate shoulder straps with rank badges attached.

Shoulder Cape.—Scarlet, with shoulder straps.

Hat.—Grey felt, with chocolate swathing.

Waterproof Cloak.—Grey, similar to colour of dress.

The following distinctions will be observed in the grades of the Service :—

MATRON IN CHIEF.

37. Dress.—Coat, skirt and blouse, with chocolate collar and cuffs and shoulder straps, with two strips of chocolate down front of blouse. Two rows of gold braid on collar and cuffs.

38. Badge.—Australian Army Nursing Service on the right arm, gold embroidered.

PRINCIPAL MATRON.

39. Same uniform as Matron in Chief, but with one row of gold braid on collar and cuffs.

MATRONS.

40. Coat, skirt and blouse, chocolate collar and cuffs and chocolate shoulder straps.

Badge.—Australian Army Nursing Service, on right arm, silver embroidered.

SISTERS AND STAFF NURSES.

41. Coat, skirt and blouse, chocolate strap on Norfolk coat.

Badge.—Australian Army Nursing Service, silk embroidered.

42. RIFLE CLUBS.—(Optional.)

Hat.—Universal pattern, described in para. 18, but not to be looped up at side.

43. **Hat Band.**—Silk ribbon, shade to match hat, $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide, which includes $\frac{1}{4}$ inch on top, Emerald green.

44. **Jacket.**—Khaki cloth; single breasted; patrol back; slits at sides $4\frac{1}{4}$ inches up; two small darts cut out of neck; a hook on left side at waist; stand-and-fall collar, to fasten with two hooks and eyes; stand $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches at back, $\frac{3}{4}$ inch in front; fall 2 inches. Collar edges run V shape, showing top button between; two cross-patch outside breast pockets, $6\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide and 8 inches deep from the top of the flap, $1\frac{1}{2}$ -in. pleat in the centre, and expanding pleat on outer side, three-pointed flap with button hole to cover pockets, $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep at the points, $6\frac{3}{8}$ inches wide; the top of the pocket to be in line with second button of the jacket; two pockets below the waist, $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide at the top, $9\frac{1}{4}$ inches at the bottom; three-pointed flap with button hole to cover pockets, $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep at the points, and $9\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide; five large bone buttons down the front, small bone buttons to fasten flap of each pocket. Shoulder straps to be sewn in sleeve head, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide at the base, the top of the strap triangular, the corners to be $1\frac{1}{8}$ inches long, which should reach to the bottom edge of collar; $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. conjoined letters, "R.C.," in brass, to be worn on each shoulder strap.

45. **Jacket.**—Khaki drill; patrol back; slits at sides $4\frac{1}{4}$ inches deep; stand-and-fall collar, to fasten with two hooks and eyes; stand $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches at back, $\frac{3}{4}$ inch in front; fall 2 inches, to fasten with one hook and eye. Collar edges to run V shape, showing top button between; two cross-patch outside breast pockets, $6\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide, $7\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep, to the top of the flap; $1\frac{3}{8}$ -in. pleat in centre, with expanding pleat on outer side, flap to be rounded with button hole $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep at centre and $6\frac{3}{8}$ inches

wide; the top of pocket to be in line with second button of the jacket, two pockets below the waist, $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide at the top, $9\frac{1}{4}$ inches at the bottom; rounded flap to cover pockets, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep at the centre, $9\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide. Five large detachable bone buttons of approved pattern down the front; small detachable bone buttons to fasten flap of each pocket; shoulder straps to be sewn in sleeve head $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide at the base by $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at the top rounded corners, and must reach the top edge of collar, to be fastened by a small detachable bone button; $\frac{5}{8}$ -in. conjoined letters, "R.C.," in brass, to be worn on each shoulder strap.

46. Trousers.—Of same material as jacket.

47. Musketry Badge.—Crossed Rifles of gilding metal.

Note.—It will be optional for members of Rifle Clubs to wear either of the above uniforms, e.g., khaki drill or khaki cloth.

48. All ranks of the Militia will on expiration of their term of service be permitted to retain their uniform.

V.—WEARING OF OLD PATTERN UNIFORM.

49. Full Dress.—Distinctive patterns of full dress hitherto authorized may continue to be worn until worn out by those now in possession of them when not on parade with other troops.

50. Articles of uniform which become obsolete by authorized changes of pattern will be worn until unserviceable.

Officers of the Militia Forces appointed Brigade Majors will wear the uniform of their Corps with the following staff distinctions :—

Gorget patches, scarlet.
Puggaree, khaki.

Officers may supply themselves privately with breeches, jacket, great-coat, and trousers, in lieu of receiving the ordinary free issue, and may, on production of sub-vouchers, showing evidence of payment, recover the cost of such clothing, *not exceeding the published prices*. The payment of such sums shall be entered in the record of clothing issues of the unit, as if the articles paid for had been issued in kind.

APPENDIX II.

(a) BUTTONS, BADGES, AND DESIGNATION OF UNITS.

Buttons.—Will be of universal pattern as sealed, and will bear the Imperial crown, the design of the Commonwealth, and the words "Australian Military Forces."

Badges.—The badge to be worn on the hat will consist of a coloured band (see para. 21), to denote the "Arm" and a number to denote the unit.

Commanding Officers are permitted to supply, from regimental funds, abbreviations (in brass) of the official designation or territorial title of the unit, or other regimental emblem or badge, and they may be worn on the collar, shoulder strap, flap of the hat, or field service cap. All such additions are subject to approval by Head-Quarters, and the whole of a unit is to be dressed alike.

Officers serving abroad are permitted to wear on the shoulder strap, while with other troops, the word "Australia" in brass or gilt letters.

(1) Warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates who are employed as artificers wear the following trade badges on jackets :—

Saddlers—a bit.

Farriers and Shoeing-smiths—a horseshoe.

Wheelers and Carpenters—a wheel.

Armourers, Fitters, Machinery Artificers, Armament Artificers, and Smiths—hammer and pincers.

(2) A Geneva cross badge will be worn on jackets and greatcoats of A.A.M.O. on the right arm. Warrant officers below rank badge, non-commissioned officers above chevrons.

(3) All non-commissioned officers of Artillery above rank of corporal wear a gun on jacket above chevrons ; Engineers wear a grenade.

(4) Chevrons and badges of rank and Geneva crosses will be worn on the right arm of jackets and greatcoats. Badges and chevrons will be worn above the elbow in all cases except the following, when they will be worn below the elbow :—

All badges for warrant officers and badges and chevrons for non-commissioned officers wearing 4-bar chevrons (Acting staff sergeants-major excepted).

(5) Four-bar chevrons worn below the elbow will be worn with the point upwards ; good conduct badges will be worn below the elbow on the left arm with the point upwards.

(6) The chevrons will be of drab worsted on khaki. Badges of rank, except chevrons, will be of brass or gilding metal.

(7) The position of badges of men of normal dimensions will be as follows :—The point of 1-bar chevrons will be 9 inches ; 2-bar, 9½ inches ; 3-bar, 10½ inches ; and the 4-bar, 11 inches from the top of sleeve.

(8) The centre of the good conduct badge, the 4-bar chevron, and the warrant officers' or skill at arms badges worn on jackets will be about half an inch above the point of the cuff ; on service dress and other jackets with plain cuffs, the lower edge or points of the warrant officers' or skill at arms badges will be 6½ inches ; the point of the 4-bar chevron 9 inches ; of the 1-bar good conduct badge, 7½ inches ; the 2-bar, 8 inches ; 3-bar, 8½ inches from bottom of sleeve.

(9) The lower edge or point of the trade badge, Geneva cross, or badge of appointment, when worn by privates on jackets, will be 9 inches from the top of the sleeve.

(10) Trade badges worn by non-commissioned officers should be affixed with the lower edge three-quarters of an inch above the point of the "V" of chevron, and the artillery gun, or gun and crown when worn, about the same distance above the trade badge. The grenade of engineers will be worn immediately above the trade badge.

(11) When a skill at arms badge and a good conduct badge are worn, the former will be placed above the latter.

(12) On greatcoats, the point of the 1-bar chevron will be 9 inches, the 2-bar $9\frac{1}{2}$ inches, the 3-bar $10\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and the 4-bar 11 inches from the top of the sleeve, and of the 4-bar, when worn below the elbow, 11 inches from the bottom of the cuff.

Musketry badges will be worn on the left forearm, with the exception of the crossed rifles and crown issued to sergeants of the best shooting squadron or company, which will be worn on the right forearm.

Gun layers wear their badge on the right arm above the elbow and above chevrons, if in possession of any.

All other badges will be worn on the left arm below the elbow

APPENDIX III.

The following extracts from War Office Dress Regulations are published for information, and, in so far as they apply to A.M. Forces, for guidance of all concerned :—

DECORATIONS AND MEDALS.

METHOD OF WEARING.

1. Worn on the left breast, in the Full Dress garment. They are to be worn in a horizontal line, suspended from a single bar or buckle, which is not to be seen, or stitched to the garment, and placed immediately between the first and second buttons from the bottom of the collar.
2. War Medals are worn in the order of the dates of the campaigns for which they have been conferred, the first obtained being placed farthest from the left shoulder.
3. Medals awarded by the Royal Humane Society or other recognized institution for bravery in saving life will, when authorized, be worn in a position corresponding with war medals, on the right breast.
4. When the decorations and medals cannot, on account of their number, be suspended from the bar so as to be fully seen, they are to overlap.
5. Medals are to be worn so as to show the Sovereign's head.
6. The first earned clasp should be worn nearest the medal.

MINIATURE DECORATIONS AND MEDALS.

7. Worn with Mess Dress, and with Evening Dress (plain clothes) as directed in para. 43. To be worn on the lapel in one horizontal line.
8. Miniature decorations will be of the same size as miniature medals. A Knight Grand Cross, Knight Grand Commander, Knight Commander, or Commander, will wear the miniature of the Companionship or Membership of the Order. When the miniature of the Order of the Bath or of St. Michael and St. George is worn by a Knight Grand Cross or a Knight Commander, the buckle will be omitted.
9. The miniature of Companionship or Membership of an Order will not be removed when in Evening Dress (plain clothes), the broad riband, star, or badge is worn by a Knight Grand Cross, Knight Commander, &c.

RIBANDS OF DECORATIONS AND MEDALS.

10. *Full Dress*.—The riband is not to exceed 1 inch in length unless the number of clasps require it to be longer. The uppermost clasp to be 1 inch below the top of the riband. The buckles attached to the ribands of the third class of the Orders of the Bath and St. Michael and St. George should show half-way between the upper and lower edge of the ribbon.
11. *Undress*.—Ribands will be $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in length, and will be sewn on to the cloth of the coat or jacket, or with white or khaki, worn on a bar without intervals, in the same position as prescribed for decorations and medals. They should not overlap, and when there is not sufficient room to wear the ribands in one row they should be worn in two or more rows, the lower being placed $\frac{1}{2}$ inch below the upper.
12. Ribands are not to be worn on the greatcoat or other over garment.
13. Members of the Nursing Service in possession of the Royal Red Cross will, when in uniform, wear the riband on the left breast on occasions when the decoration itself is not worn.

14. STARS OF ORDERS WILL BE WORN—

- In Review order.
- In Review order (staff in blue).
- In Evening Dress (plain clothes) as directed in para. 43.

15. All Stars of Orders are to be worn in Review order, and in Evening Dress (plain clothes) as directed in para. 43.

16. The Star of the Senior Order or decoration only will be worn in Review order (staff in blue) unless it be desired to compliment a member of a particular Order when the Star of that Order may be substituted.

17. The Stars of Foreign Orders will be worn on the right or left breast according to the regulations laid down by the Sovereign by whom they are conferred.

18. The foregoing regulations apply to the wearing, by members and honorary associates, of the badge of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England.

19. In Foreign countries officers will wear their stars when Foreign officers wear theirs.

RIBANDS AND BADGES OF ORDERS.

20. On State occasions, Knights Grand Cross and Knights Grand Commanders of any British Orders, except the Order of the Garter and the Order of the Thistle, will, when in Review order or Evening Dress (plain clothes), wear the broad ribands of the Orders, over the right shoulder and under the sash or belt. The ribands of the Orders of the Garter and the Thistle are worn over the left shoulder. Knights Commanders and Commanders will, when in Review order or in Evening Dress (plain clothes) wear the ribands of the Orders inside the collar of the tunic or coat, the badge being suspended 2 inches below the lower edge of the collar.

21. Commanders of the Royal Victorian Order will wear the badge around the neck when in Review order (staff in blue).

22. Badges of Orders are not to be worn except as above.

23. In Review order Knights Commanders of two or more Orders will wear round the neck the riband and badge of the senior Order, and may also wear the ribands and badges of one or more of the other Orders. In Evening Dress (plain clothes) only the ribbon and badge of the senior Order will be worn.

24. On collar days the Knights Grand Cross and Knights Grand Commanders of the several Orders wear the collar and badge and the star. The collar is worn under the shoulder cords and over the aiguillette. It is fastened to the shoulder cords by bows of white satin riband, 1½ inches wide, and arranged so as to hang equally at back and front. When the collar is worn, the ribands and badges of the same order will not be worn. The collar is never worn after sunset. In the case of a Knight possessing two or more collars only one collar is worn at a time.

26. In Undress the broad ribands of a Knight Grand Cross, Knight Grand Commander, Knight Commander, or Commander of an Order, are not worn. The small riband of the Companionship or Membership of the Order is worn on the left breast.

STATE, OFFICIAL, OR PUBLIC OCCASIONS.

27. It will be considered a State occasion when the Sovereign, or the representative of the Sovereign, is present; the parade in celebration of the birthday of the Sovereign; or when specially ordered on the occasion of any parade, ceremony, or entertainment at which a member of the Royal Family is present.

28. A function or entertainment given or arranged by any Government Department or Government Institution will be regarded as an official occasion.

29. When invitations are issued in the name of any Municipal Corporation, Institution, Society, or Livery Company, it will be regarded as a public occasion.

ORDER IN WHICH DECORATIONS AND MEDALS ARE TO BE WORN.

32. These emblems do not form part of the decoration or medal, and are not to be worn on the riband when the decoration or medal is worn in original, or in miniature in evening dress.

FOREIGN DECORATIONS AND FOREIGN MEDALS.

33. The rules governing the wearing of British decorations also apply to Foreign decorations for which full permission has been given. Foreign decorations for which private permission has been given will be worn in Review order, in Mess Dress, and in Evening Dress (plain clothes) on the occasions specified in the letter of authority only, on the left of all decorations and medals. The ribands of such decorations will not be worn on the breast in Review order (staff in blue) nor in Undress or Service Dress. The star of such a decoration will only be worn in Review order (staff in blue) when specially directed. Miniatures of such decorations will only be worn on the occasion mentioned in the letter of authority when Mess Dress or Evening Dress (plain clothes) is worn.

34. Foreign medals, other than war medals, are governed by the same rules as foreign decorations.

35. A foreign war medal, the wearing of which has been sanctioned by His Majesty, or its riband, or miniature, will be worn in all orders of dress in the same way as British medals.

RIBANDS OF FOREIGN ORDERS, DECORATIONS, AND MEDALS.

36. The ribands of foreign orders, decorations, and medals worn on Service Dress and Undress uniforms will be the plain riband of the Order, Decoration, or Medal, as the case may be, with the exception of that of the Legion of Honour.

37. The riband of the Legion of Honour will be plain in the case of the grade of Chevalier. The classes above Chevalier will wear the riband with a small rosette.

DECORATIONS AND MEDALS ARE WORN IN THE SEVERAL ORDERS OF DRESS AND IN EVENING DRESS (PLAIN CLOTHES) AS FOLLOWS :—

38. *Review Order*.—Broad riband and badge of a grand cross.

All stars of Orders.

Knights Commanders and Commanders of one Order will wear the badge of that Order round the neck, and Knights Commanders and Commanders of two or more Orders will wear the badge of the senior Order round the neck. They may also wear the badges of one or more of the other Orders.

When the collar is worn, the broad riband of the grand cross of the same Order is not worn.

39. *Review Order (staff in blue)*.—Small ribands of the width of the companionship or membership of Orders and of Medals, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch in length on the breast. The star of the senior Order only is usually to be worn to the left and just clear of the left hand side row of buttons, but, when specially directed, the star of another Order may be substituted. The riband badge assigned to a Knight Grand Cross, Knight Grand Commander, Knight Commander of an Order is not worn. Commanders of the Royal Victorian Order will wear the badge round the neck.

40. *Mess Dress*.—Miniature decorations and medals will be worn. Miniature decorations will be of the same size as miniature medals, and Knights Grand Cross, Knights Grand Commanders, Knights Commanders, and Commanders will wear the miniature of the companionship or membership.

41. *Undress and Service Dress*.—Small ribands, of the width of the companionship or membership of Orders and of medals $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in length, on the breast.

42. *Evening Dress (Plain Clothes)*.—Broad riband and badge of a grand cross, with star of the Order, and stars of all other Orders, as directed in para. 43. Knights Commanders and Commanders of one Order, of which the star is worn, will wear the badge of that Order round the neck, and Knights Commanders and Commanders of two or more Orders, of which the stars are worn, will wear the badge of the senior Order only. Miniature decorations and medals on the lapel of the coat. Knights Grand Cross, Knights Commanders, &c., wear the same miniatures with Evening Dress as with Mess Dress, and do not remove the miniatures of companionship or membership when the higher grade decoration is worn.

43. When Evening Dress (plain clothes) is worn, orders, decorations, and medals will be worn as follows :—

(a) At all parties and dinners when any member of the Royal Family is present, riband, stars, and miniature decorations and medals will be worn.

- (b) At all parties and dinners given in the houses of Ambassadors and Ministers accredited to the Court of St. James, riband, stars, and miniature decorations and medals will be worn. The decoration of the country concerned should be worn in preference to the English one, and if both are worn, the former should take preference of the latter.

For informal or private dinners at an embassy or legation, when the Ambassador or Minister does not wish decorations to be worn, the Ambassador or Minister will be asked to make a notification to that effect on the invitation card.

- (c) On official occasions at the house of the Lord Lieutenant of a country within his country, and at all parties and dinners given by the Lord Mayor at the Mansion House and Guildhall, riband, stars, and miniature decorations and medals will be worn.
- (d) At all parties and dinners of an official nature given in the houses of Cabinet Ministers, ex-Cabinet Ministers, Knights of the Garter, Knights of the Thistle, Knights of St. Patrick, or Great Officers of the Household, stars, not riband,* will be worn.
- (e) At all official dinners and receptions, including those of the City Livery Companies, and City Corporations, regimental dinners, official naval dinners, and all public dinners given in aid of charitable institutions, star, not riband,* will be worn.
- (f) At unofficial dinner parties or evening receptions in private houses, Knights of the Garter, Knights of the Thistle, or Knights of St. Patrick should wear a star only.
- (g) The above are the only occasions on which decorations and medals will be worn with Evening Dress.

44. The foregoing instructions apply to retired officers as regards the wearing of decorations and medals in Review order.

* The expression "stars, not riband" means:—For Knights Grand Cross—stars, no riband; for members of the Order of Merit—badge and riband round the neck; for Knights Commanders—stars, no badge round the neck; for C.V.O.'s—badge and riband round the neck; for all classes—miniature medals and decorations.

FITTING OF CLOTHING.

Officers Commanding Units will personally supervise the fitting of clothing. They will satisfy themselves that each man has been issued with garments of suitable size. As Service Dress Suits will be fitted loosely—fitting with exactitude will not be necessary.

The proper fitting of boots, however, is a matter of the first importance, and Commanding Officers will be held responsible that it is carefully carried out.
